Sermon followed by Service

Romans 8:26-27 October 17, 2021

You're groaning inside. You're in the ICU, or the ER, or some hospital room in between ER and ICU. You're there sitting, standing, at bedside. Your mom, dad, grandpa, or grandma; your husband, wife, or maybe your child is there in the hospital bed. Or maybe it's you in the bed. Tubes up in the nose, maybe down the throat, mask over the face, wires and sensors attached to the chest, IV bags dripping, pumps pumping - food, water, medicine, painkillers - into veins stuck with needles. You don't know if any of it is doing any good or will do any good. You watch the lines on the heart monitor screens and you don't know. You watch your loved one breathe in and breathe out; you hear them moan and groan; and you don't know. You don't know what to pray for. Do you pray for all of it to work? For how long? To what end? Or do you pray for relief and release? Your heart tugs one way and then the other. Your brain thinks one way and then it can't, it just can't think at all. And you sit there, you stand there, you lie there wondering what to pray for.

Or maybe you're not there yet. You're in the ER waiting room, or the doctor office waiting room. Or you're at home waiting, your mind spinning around for hours, for days, for weeks. You're waiting for the test results, the treatment plan. You're waiting for you, your child, your loved one. You're waiting and you know you could be praying, should be praying, but you don't know what to pray for.

You look in the mirror and you see a failure. You look around and you feel alone; your world, your family, your friends, pulling away. You feel a darkness inside you and around you, an emptiness sucking the life out of you. You feel on edge, an uneasiness inside you. You feel like your whole life, your whole world is off, off kilter, off balance; you wish you could just shut it all off - your feelings, your life, your self. You know you shouldn't feel that way, but you do. Someone tells you to pray. You know you should pray, but with all that's going on inside, you just don't know how to pray, what to pray, you wonder: "what good would it do anyway?"

You're groaning inside, hurting inside, crushed inside, afraid inside - and you don't know what you should do; you don't know what you should pray. Maybe it's your mom, your dad, your husband, your wife, a friend, a boss, a co-worker. You want to get along. You try to do the right thing. But it's never good enough; you're never good enough. They make you pay in ways you don't want to say. So you don't know what to pray. They treat you so wrong; you feel so wrong; you

wonder if you even get to pray. And then the thought enters your mind: "God is letting it happen": so you wonder: "What would I, how could I, why would I pray?"

You're groaning inside and you know what you should do. You know your sin. You know you should repent and turn back to God. You know you need to stop your ______. But it just seems so impossible, impossible to turn your life around, impossible to make life right, so impossible to get back on track. So impossible you don't know what to pray.

Which of those scenarios is the worst, the darkest, the most difficult?

Ever feel that way? Groaning inside - hurt, heart-broken. Not knowing what to pray. Not knowing if you get to pray. Sometimes we can be so unsure, so bewildered about what to pray, that we just curl up and quit. Other times, we might be so hurt, so angry at the evil in our lives that we can't even think of praying. It happens - doesn't it? - life gets hard, and it gets hard, so hard, to pray.

At those times, "in our groaning times" - and we all have them, don't we? - God doesn't leave us on our own waiting for us to pray, waiting for us to come up with the right prayer. No, "in our groaning times," God the Holy Spirit helps us in our weakness. The Greek in that word "help" caught my attention. Paul doesn't say that the Spirit steps in and takes over for us, but that the Spirit steps in and works together with us. That's a good reminder for me for when I want to throw up my hands: "I can't pray; I don't know what to say." When we don't know what to pray, we have the Spirit stepping in to help us.

Agree / Disagree A strong faith is able to say: "I don't need to pray. I trust that whatever the Father does, it will be good and right for me."

And how does he help? The Spirit nudges; he reminds; he works faith and trust; he gives wisdom and understanding. And the more we fill ourselves up with the Spirit in here [Bible], the more comfortable, the bolder, the wiser we'll be in our prayers. But that's not what's in our lesson today. In our lesson today, we see the Spirit doing something else for us. He doesn't just nudge us in our prayers. The Spirit also intercedes for us. The Spirit speaks up to the Father on our behalf.

We might not know what to pray for, but the Holy Spirit living inside us, he does know what to pray for. He knows us better than we know us; he knows what we need better than we know what we need. And he speaks up for us. How? In groans that words cannot express. Just as we groan in our hurt and heartache and weakness, the Spirit groans with us and the Spirit groans for us.

What exactly does that mean? Paul doesn't explain. Instead Paul wants you to know that the Father knows. He knows what's in your heart - your hurt, your hopes, your wants, your needs. And he knows what his Holy Spirit - the Spirit living in you, his Spirit speaking up for you - the Father knows what the Spirit wants for you. The Spirit's groans aren't lost on the Father; their meaning isn't lost to the Father. God knows you and he knows his Spirit living in you.

And you can know that what the Spirit prays for you fits with what the Father wants. We might be reluctant to speak up for ourselves for fear that we might say the wrong thing - that we might cross God, that we might ask for the wrong thing. When the Holy Spirit speaks up for you, he doesn't and he won't say the wrong thing. He will speak up for your hurts and your hopes in a way that touches God's heart and mind, that touches God's love for you as one of his saints.

"One of his saints." I don't know about you, but in my groaning times, I seldom feel like a saint. I feel small; I feel weak. I might feel like I have it coming. So many of my groaning times are because of self-inflicted hurts, self-inflicted failures. So many of my groaning times are because I am a sinner and not because I am a saint. Even when I'm groaning in here [in my heart] over someone else, their hurts and heartaches, your hurts and heartaches, it's hard to see myself, hear myself, think of myself as a saint. It's hard to imagine God seeing me, hearing me as a saint. It's hard to imagine the Holy Spirit speaking up for me as a saint. And yet, that is what God does for you and for me.

When he hears you groaning and calling to him, even with your self-inflicted hurts and heartaches, he doesn't say: "You had it coming." When he hears us groaning and calling to him for each other, he doesn't listen to us because we've won his heart with our goodness. In the same way, when the Spirit speaks up for us and the Father listens, it's not because we've won their heart with our goodness. No. They hear you and see you with Jesus, with his cross, with his perfect life covering you. They see our lives, our messed-up hearts and minds, they hear our mixed-up prayers all forgiven and covered over with the perfect life of Jesus. They

see your hearts and minds, the Father hears your prayers all covered and filled with the goodness of Jesus.

What does that get to mean for us? Think about it. What have they - the Father and the Spirit - done for Jesus? They got him through his groaning times; they have him safe with them in heaven! And they will do the same for you - they will get you through your groaning times, for life safe and loved in heaven. Amen.

Think of some of the "groaning times" in Jesus' life. What did Jesus do in his groaning times? What did the Father and His Spirit do for Jesus in his groaning times? As saints in Jesus, what does that get to mean for us?

In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints in accordance with God's will.

GOSPEL LESSON Luke 11:1-13

One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples."

He said to them, "When you pray, say:

"'Father,

hallowed be your name, your kingdom come.

Give us each day our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins,

for we also forgive everyone who sins against us.

And lead us not into temptation. "

Then he said to them, "Suppose one of you has a friend, and he goes to him at midnight and says, 'Friend, lend me three loaves of bread, because a friend of mine on a journey has come to me, and I have nothing to set before him.' "Then the one inside answers, 'Don't bother me. The door is already locked, and my children are with me in bed. I can't get up and give you anything.' I tell you, though he will not get up and give him the bread because he is his friend, yet because of the man's boldness he will get up and give him as much as he needs.

"So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened.

"Which of you fathers, if your son asks for a fish, will give him a snake instead? Or if he asks for an egg, will give him a scorpion? If you then, though you are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!"

NICENE CREED
