FIRST LESSON

2 Corinthians 5:11, 14-21

Since, then, we know what it is to fear the Lord, we try to persuade men. What we are is plain to God, and I hope it is also plain to your conscience.

For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again.

So from now on we regard no one from a worldly point of view. Though we once regarded Christ in this way, we do so no longer. Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting men's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

SERMON

John 20:19-23

Down the street, on the way to Culver's, somebody has a really nice-looking motorcycle. Part of me says: "I'd like a motorcycle like that." A smarter part of me says: "Bad idea, Kevin. Bad idea." On my computer, I see screen-saver images; part of me sees waters I want to kayak, mountains I want to climb, places I want to hike, cities and villages around the world I was to see and visit. Another part of me says: "Culver's is closer; custard is smoother, and quicker, and easier." And so I'm torn.

What do I know? If I go to Culver's ... as good as Culver's is ... if I set out to live the Culver's life - sitting back to enjoy life smooth, easy, and full of friendly - sooner or later I'm going to get antsy. Antsy for something more than sitting back; antsy for something more than smooth, easy, and full of smiles. Sooner or later I'm going to get antsy to do something worthwhile, something more worthwhile than just sitting back, living life smooth and easy. And here's something else I know. If I go kayaking, and hiking, and climbing, and walking the streets of Europe - as good as that is for my body and for my mind - sooner or later I'm going to get antsy. Antsy for something more than fun, antsy for something more than relaxing, antsy for something more than adventure. Antsy to do something worthwhile - antsy to do something that will matter.

How long does it take you to get antsy? Are you too quick or too slow to get antsy? What do you do with your antsiness?

In our lesson today, Easter Sunday evening, the disciples weren't there yet. They weren't getting antsy yet. They were more of what we talked about last week - stressed, afraid, riddled with guilt, especially afraid. So Jesus doesn't step in and say: "Let's get going." No, Jesus steps in and says: "**Peace be with you**."

Do we know when to command when to calm, when to "should" and when to soothe? What traps do we want to avoid?

Peace for what? Peace for their guilt. They had doubted him, bailed out on him. And so they had given Jesus, God himself, plenty of reasons to doubt them, to bail out on them, to write them off. Instead, Jesus says: "**Peace be with you**." And when Jesus showed himself and the disciples saw that it really was Jesus, they were overjoyed. Jesus was back! And he wasn't back with a scowl to write them off; he was back with a smile -"**Peace**" - peace and forgiveness for their guilt. And that meant ... peace and forgiveness for their guilt meant peace for their fear. They didn't need to be afraid. Jesus was back! Whoever was against Jesus couldn't get rid of him; whatever they did to Jesus couldn't stop him. Sin, death, the devil - Jesus had beaten them all. And now he was back. So all the people, all the things the disciples were afraid of - they didn't need to fear any more. Jesus was back - "**Peace be with you!**"

It may feel easier to share peace for people in their fear than to share peace for people in their guilt. What traps or dangers does that present?

You've been there, haven't you - afraid, stressed - your life a mess, trouble everywhere? We've all been there, riddled with guilt - guilt for failing someone we love, guilt for failing God. We've all been there, haven't we? Just as sure as Jesus said to those disciples "**Peace be with you**," Jesus says to you: "**Peace be with you**." He takes his word and promise here [in the Bible] and he give it to you in Baptism ("**your sins are washed away**"); he gives it to you in his Supper ("**my body given for you, my blood shed for the forgiveness of sins**"). Yes, Jesus says to you: "**Peace be with you**." Peace and forgiveness for your guilt. Peace and his promise and presence in all your troubles.

What if, after Jesus said "**Peace be with you**," what if Jesus would have said: "Go home, go back to your old life - BC-before Christ. I'll catch up with you on the other side." How long do you think it would have taken for the disciples to get antsy - "I'm supposed to go home and just go back to life the way it was?" How long do you think it would have taken for the disciples to get antsy, wanting to do something with Easter, wanting to do something with Jesus, wanting to do something for the people around them who didn't know about Jesus or Easter?

And if they didn't get antsy? What if they went home and settled into, let's say, the Culver's-life, smooth and easy and all full of smiles? What if they decided they had already done their thing and figured it was time to live the vacation life? What if they just went back to living life the way it was, the same as anybody and everybody else, like Jesus and Easter didn't change anything? What if they didn't get antsy to do something with Jesus or for Jesus or for the people around them who didn't know Jesus or Easter? If they didn't get antsy to do something with Jesus and with Easter, what would you think

of those disciples? We'd think Jesus really didn't mean much to them, that they really didn't get what Easter is about, right?

Answer that (2^{nd}) last question: "What if the disciples wouldn't have gotten antsy to do something with Jesus?" What would that say about the disciples?

If we don't get antsy to do something with Jesus, what does that say about us?

What about us? What about you? Has Easter worn off and you're content looking for life smooth and easy with nothing but smiles? Has Easter worn off and you're looking for life to be fun and exciting without any real responsibilities? Has Easter worn off and you're ready to live the life of the world as if Jesus and Easter never happened? That doesn't seem right, does it?

And it sure isn't the Easter life that Jesus gives us, is it? Right after Jesus shows himself to his disciples, right after he says: "**Peace be with you**," Jesus also says: "**Just as the Father sent me, I am sending you**." Jesus didn't send his disciples back to live the life of the world. And he doesn't send us out to live the life of the world. Instead he sends us into the world to work the love of God and to share the heart of God.

"Just as the Father sent [Jesus]." What is ominous in those words? What is comforting in those words? What is exciting in those words?

How? A couple days earlier, Jesus had told them: "Love one another." How? A couple days before that, Jesus had told the parable of the sheep and goats. And who is invited into heaven? His sheep, and what had they done? They had taken care of the poor and the hungry; they had taken in strangers, looked after the sick, went out of their way to visit the imprisoned. Now, on this Easter evening, Jesus focuses on something else. "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven." Jesus gives his disciples the keys.

Why is it important to remember the breadth of Jesus' commission (as described in this previous paragraph)?

Do you remember your first key? Chances are it was an old key, a key to an old lock, a key that didn't matter any more - it wouldn't matter if it got lost, or stolen, or if it were never used. Then at some point, you were trusted with some real keys, was it the key to the house or the key to the car? Either way, a big deal, right? On Easter Sunday evening Jesus gave his disciples ... he gave his church ... the keys to heaven. Not just to handle and hold as neat and shiny, not just to use in case of emergency, but to lock or to

loose the sin that would keep a sinner out of heaven, to lock or to open the way to heaven.

That's right. Jesus has given you the key that locks sin, that locks the way to heaven. We might think: "I don't want to do that; I don't want to lock somebody out of heaven." You using, our using the locking key doesn't keep someone out of heaven. Telling the truth about sin doesn't keep someone out of heaven. It's the sinner's sin, the sinner's refusal to repent that locks them out of heaven. So what does the locking key do? It announces the truth of God's Law - "**the soul that sins, it will die**; the soul that holds on to their sin, will die without Jesus; the soul that lives without Jesus, will die without Jesus."

Why would we, why would you say that? Well, why do you warn people that the stove is hot? Why do you tell people of the storm, the tornado that is coming? To warn them and save them from the danger. Not sounding the warning doesn't make the tornado go away, does it? Not sounding the warning doesn't make the stove cool to the touch, does it? In the same way, taking the easy way out, and not sounding the warning of sin and hell, doesn't make sin safe.

When is sin safe? Who determines the safety of sin?

There is no way to make sin safe. There is a way to make sin go away. For those who want to be free from their sin.... Note - I didn't say: "For those who want to be free to sin...." I said, "For those who want to be free from their sin," Jesus has given us the loosing key, the forgiving key. The loosing key is the Good News of sins forgiven in Jesus. The loosing key frees from guilt; it frees the heart to live in step with God; it opens the way to heaven. In other words, the locking key tells the hard truth of Judgment Day and hell; the loosing key tells the beautiful truth of Christmas, Good Friday, and Easter, the beautiful truth of life with God in heaven.

Whose gospel is "You are forgiven and free to sin"? Whose gospel is "You are forgiven and free to do what you want"? Whose gospel is "You are forgiven and free for life with Jesus"?

Earlier I talked about getting antsy. If there is anything that should get us antsy, it's the thought of a loved one, family, friend, neighbor, or anyone, dying in their sin without Jesus, dying in their sin without a warning. We don't like to think about that, do we? So think about this. Think of how great it would be to see that someone close to you, that someone growing farther and farther from Jesus, think of how great it would be

for them to turn from their sin, to turn back from living the life of the world, and turn back to life with Jesus. Imagine sharing "Peace" with them and hearing "Peace" back. Imagine how great it would be to celebrate Easter together with them - in heaven together! Sounds good, doesn't it? And Jesus doesn't just send us to family and friends, does he? Think of how great it is when anyone gets to know Jesus, when they turn from their old life to live with Jesus. You get to be part of that. Makes us antsy to do something with Jesus, doesn't it? Amen.

What is the difference between a life that is smooth, easy, and empty; and a life that is smooth, easy, and meaningful?

What is the difference between a life that is adventurous and empty, and adventurous and meaningful?
