I made a mistake. I googled "famous cover-ups." And what came up? Beach-wear. Women's beach-wear. I scrolled down. And what did I find? UFOs, aliens, the CIA's exploding cigars. I scrolled down some more. And what did I find? Cover-ups so sick and sad, it's no wonder people don't trust churches. Cover-ups so disturbing and deadly, it's no wonder people don't trust government. I didn't have to google to find cover-ups, did I? We could do a Bible search. Go back to the beginning of time, and we see Adam and Eve using leaves and lies to try to cover up what they did. Go back to last week, and we see David trying to cover up what he did.

David knew he was wrong. But he did it anyway. He took Bathsheba as his own to do what he wanted. David knew he was wrong. And when he found out that he had made Bathsheba pregnant, he tried to cover it up. He sent for Uriah, Bathsheba's husband, hoping that he would cover up what David had done. When that didn't work, he sent Uriah to his death, hoping that would cover up what he had done. It didn't.

David pretended that it did. David pretended that all was good and right, that he was good and right. He pretended to be the caring king and took Bathsheba as his wife, and her son as his own. David pretended that all was good and right, that he was good and right. But it didn't work. The messengers he sent to take Bathsheba, they knew. Joab, the general David ordered to arrange Uriah's death, he knew. Secrets like that rarely remain secrets. Soon, who else knew? David pretended that no one knew, but God knew.

I wonder, did David write Psalm 139 before or after this? "O LORD, you have searched me and you know me. You know when

I sit and when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar. You discern my going out and my lying down; you are familiar with all my ways. Before a word is on my tongue you know it completely, O LORD."

God knew. And he was displeased, distressed; he saw what David did as evil. God knew. And he made sure David knew - his cover-up wasn't working, his pretending wasn't working, his life wasn't as right as he pretended. God knew what David had done as horribly wrong, and he made sure David knew what he had done as horribly wrong. It's not in our lesson, but in Psalm 32, David tells us how God had worked on him, how God had worked him over. "When I kept silent, my bones wasted away through my groaning all day long. For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was sapped as in the heat of summer." Was David writing about this time in his life? We don't know for sure, but it sure seems to fit. With a guilty conscience, God made sure David knew his pretending, his cover-up wasn't working.

But we're not quick to give up our pretending, are we? We're not quick to quit our cover-ups. So, in our lesson, God makes sure David knows his pretending and his cover-up weren't working with God. The LORD - the God of saving grace - sends his prophet Nathan to David.

You notice how Nathan didn't get right in David's face. Instead, he tugs at David's heart, tells the story of a rich man and a poor man. The rich man had sheep and cattle; he was rich with sheep and cattle. But the poor man had only one lamb; he raised it and cared for it like one of the family. The rich man has a guest. What does he serve up for supper? Instead of taking one of his own sheep, one from his own cattle, he takes the poor man's lamb, and serves her up for

supper. Nathan tugged at David's heart, and David's heart responded. "David burned with anger against the man and said to Nathan, "As surely as the LORD lives, the man who did this deserves to die!"

With a big, bold "you," Nathan connects the dots for David: "You are the man." "The LORD has blessed and blessed and blessed you; he has given and given and given to you. But that wasn't good enough, was it? You despised the LORD and you despised his Word."

Did you notice? David's sin wasn't just against Bathsheba or Uriah. It wasn't just a sin against a cultural norm. It wasn't just a failing, a fault, a weakness, a mistake - or whatever else we call sin to make it seem small. David had done wrong against God; he had broken God's law - and so he had despised God. We don't like to think of our sin that way - do we? - as a despising of God. David knew it, and now he admitted it: "I have sinned against the LORD." No blaming, no excusing, no-small-sizing of what he had done: "I have sinned against the LORD." No more pretending; no more cover-up: "I have sinned against the LORD."

What about you? How might God see you pretending? Excusing your sin, blaming others, covering up? What about you? Is there some sin in your life that you pretend is small? Some ungodly attitude in your mind that you pretend is ok? What are you covering up, pretending to get away with?

How has God been nudging you, calling you out? What have you been doing with his nudge and call? In our lesson, God used his prophet Nathan to call David out. God doesn't always use a prophet or even a pastor to call us out. He might use the word of a child, a

tear in the eye of someone we love, a hot look, or a cold shoulder. How has God been nudging you, calling you? When God uses someone, or something, to nudge you, squeeze you - to call "you," don't pretend he's not calling you. Don't pretend all is right. Don't pretend he doesn't know, that he doesn't care, that it's alright to continue in your sin. Like David says in Psalm 32: "Don't be a stubborn mule."

Answer like David: "I have sinned against the LORD." Answer like David: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me." Answer like David, and hear Jesus answer: "The LORD has put away your sin. You are not going to die." As far as east is from west. Covered over. Erased. Washed away. See your sin taken by Jesus, at the cross paid for by Jesus. And not just your sin, but your guilt, and God's judgment, see them all "Finished" at the cross. For you.

Sometimes it's hard to see that, hear that, believe that forgiveness because sin has consequences. Sometimes our sin has consequences that continue long past the words: "You are forgiven." David's sin had consequences that tore at his heart the rest of his life. Why? God had some re-teaching to do. By his sin, David had taught the world around him - "It's alright to sin. It's alright to do whatever you want. To despise and reject God and his Word - it's alright if you can get away with it." God's sense of justice could not and can not let that lesson stand. Even more so, God's sense of love could not and can not let that lesson stand.

Look at the hurt and heartache in our world today. Even if we don't see sin damn, we do see how sin destroys and causes more damage than we like to think. God's justice, God's love needs people to know that sin is not ok; sin is toxic. And just because our sin is

forgiven ..., forgiveness doesn't make sin ok; in this life even forgiven sin is toxic. I'll say it again - God doesn't want us or anyone out there thinking that sin is ok, or that forgiveness makes sin ok! What does that mean for us? Even as God forgives full and free, in this life, he doesn't take away all the consequences, all the hurt and heartache our sin causes.

Some days we have a hard time with that, don't we? But some day, the hurt and heartache of this life will be gone, and we will be face-to-face with God - with no scowl on God's face, no wince on our face. We'll be smile-to-smile with God, enjoying life the way it's supposed to be, surrounded by the life and love, the peace and joy, of heaven all around us. David looked forward to that day ... and so do we! Amen.

You killed him with the sword of the Ammonites. Now, therefore, the sword will never depart from your house, because you despised me and took the wife of Uriah the Hittite to be your own.'

Before your very eyes I will take your wives and give them to one who is close to you, and he will sleep with your wives in broad daylight. You did it in secret, but I will do this thing in broad daylight before all Israel.' "
