August 15, 2021 Psalm 84

"There's no place I'd rather be." Where's your place? What place has you thinking: "There's no place I'd rather be"? I think of Crandall's Chicken over in Hebron. The food was good; all you can eat made it better; but the whole family together for Mom and Dad's anniversary - "There's no place I'd rather be." Or coming back from vacation in Colorado, lunch with Lisa and her mom at her mom's place out in the country, the fries were mushy; the fast-food burger was a dripping, sloppy mess; and it felt like 95 degrees inside at the farm-house table, but: "There's no place I'd rather be." Or at Cooper's restaurant in Georgetown, the last table on the deck, next to the door opening and closing, too far away to really see the stream, but there with my Lisa after a day of hiking in the mountains - "There's no place I'd rather be." Just so you don't think it's always about food, I think of sitting on the rocks at the top of Mt. Evans. I'm thinking "There's no place I'd rather be." Lisa's thinking: "I wish you weren't so close to the edge."

And there's someplace else. Here. "There's no place I'd rather be." When I say that, there's a voice in me that says: "Liar! Hypocrite!" My old sinful nature has all sorts of places he'd rather be. He'd rather be in the pews with you than up here. He'd rather be at home like you than in church. He'd rather be strolling downtown Grayslake, downtown Libertyville, pretending that all is good. He'd rather be doing his thing his way whenever wherever he wants instead of listening to somebody else. He'd even rather be doing chores, pretending that he can put his world in order and make his world right. Yes, there's a part of me that would rather not be here.

I won't tell you that he'd rather be sleeping in on Sunday mornings, or watching TV, playing video-games, or surfing the web on Sunday mornings - that gets old, old and empty, doesn't it? I shouldn't say that; our old sinful loves to pretend that empty is fulfilling, doesn't it? And so I tell myself and you: 'There's no place I'd rather be'' - not to pretend or to argue, but to win with Jesus and be wrapped in the blessing of God in the house of God.

Our lesson, Psalm 84, fits so well for a time like this. The psalmist sings: "How lovely is your dwelling place, O LORD Almighty!" We can imagine him thinking: "There's no place I'd rather be." But he can't be there. For some reason he can't get to the house of the Lord; he can't get to church. Maybe it was war; maybe it was sickness or plague; maybe some other trouble. It had to be something big that kept him away, away from God's house. It wasn't just comfort or convenience; it wasn't just chores or bores that kept him from church. He cried out: "My soul yearns, even faints, for the courts of the LORD; my heart and my flesh cry out for the living God." I've heard much the same thing from you: "My week, my life are all off if I can't start it right with God in the house of God."

Why? I think of what David said in Psalm 122, the psalm where he sings: "I was glad when they said to me: 'Let us go to the house of the LORD." David points us to God's house and says: "there the thrones of judgment stand." In our house of God, we don't have the Old Testament ark of the covenant or the altar for burning our offerings. We have better! We have the baptism font, where with water and the Word - where the Spirit of God makes us alive and new for life with God, where Jesus washes us clean for God and for heaven, where the Father puts his name on us and adopts us as his in the family of God.

Here we have the altar, rock solid, reminding us of God's unshakeable, unmoveable promise; "I'm here for you!" Here we have the altar, the table, where Jesus shares his Supper, his covenant, his promise with us: "for the forgiveness of your sins." Yes, here we have the altar where Jesus gives us his body and blood, where Jesus - God himself - gives us himself. Here we lay out our prayers to God and beg his mercy; here he promises: "I love you, I forgive you, I'm here to bless you."

Here we have the pulpit and lectern where God gathers us to hear the Word of our God. Here in his Word he gives us his commands: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and strength. And love your neighbor as yourself." Here he lays down his Law: "The soul that sins, it shall die." Here he gathers us to hear his Gospel promise: "God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." Here he empowers us and calls us to action: "You are the light of the world. Let your light shine …." Yes, here our Lord gathers us. He gathers us to forgive our guilt, to cover our shame, to heal our broken-ness, to make us strong for life and for love. Yes, here is where God loves to share his love and work his blessing.

That's why, in Psalm 27, David sang out: "One thing I ask of the Lord, this is what I seek, that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the LORD." In Colorado, up there on top of Mount Evans, some 14,000 feet above sea level, we heard a biker, a Harley Davidson biker, shout out: "There is a god!" Up on top of Mt. Evans, you can gaze out in any direction and see mountains below you. Up there in the mountains you can get a sense of the majesty of God; in the forests, along the rushing streams and cascading waterfalls where every turn could be another picture, even up above tree-line you can sense the creativity of God with such dazzling designs of beauty and enduring practicality. Up there it's easy to be awed by God.

And up there, with a slip, a fall, an afternoon lightning strike, it's easy to meet God. Are you ready to meet God? To meet the God of rock and stone, to meet the God of fire and lightning, to meet the God who demands: "Love the LORD your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your strength. [Are you ready to meet the God who demands:] Love your neighbor as yourself"? Are you ready to meet the God who judges: "The soul that sins it shall die"? As wonderful as it is to see the beauty of God out there, to truly see the love of God, God doesn't point us to the mountains, lakes, and streams, the flowers, birds, and sunshine. No, he points us to his Son, Jesus.

In Jesus, we see a love so selfless, he took our sin, the sin that would damn us, as his own and paid the price for us on the cross. In Jesus, we see a love so gracious, he invites us, no matter where we've been, no matter what we've done, he invites us in close to forgive us and bless us. In Jesus, we see a love so enduring, week after week, day after day, he invites us in to his home to see and hear his love, to share his love forever. Sometimes it's good, just to sit here and see Jesus, isn't it? And let him heal our hurts and our hearts and make us strong for a new week.

That's what the psalm writer had in mind in our lesson. He thinks of people going through what we've been going through and worse, far worse. We go through our bitter times, our difficult times. And the God we see here, the God we meet here, the God who invites us here, he showers us with his blessings to keep us going - day by day, week after week until we meet him face to face in heaven. We will, because he will. We will see him face to face in heaven, because as long as we keep on with him, he will keep on blessing us.

That's why our psalm writer says: "Better is one day in your courts than a thousand elsewhere; I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God than dwell in the tents of the wicked." That's why David says: "I was glad when they said to me: 'Let us go to the house of the LORD." And why he said: "One thing I ask of the LORD, this is what I seek that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the LORD, and to seek him in his temple." And that's why we're here - filling up with Jesus, getting ready for heaven - "There's no place I'd rather be!" Amen.



SECOND LESSON Revelation 7:9-17

After this I looked and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lamb.
