Sermon, then Service - August 21, 2022 2 Samuel 13-18 (select)

It was a worst day ever. Worse than Dan Powter's Bad Day. Worse than any Boomtown Rat Monday. Even worse than Alexander's Terrible, Horrible, Worst Day Ever.

It was a worst day ever for David. His son Absalom was dead, killed in battle. Not as a national hero following and fighting for his father, but as a traitor who betrayed his father and led his country to war against God's King David. Killed in battle, not as a hero, but shame upon shame, hung up in a tree by his hair. For David, it was a worst day ever.

I said "a worst day ever" for David, not "the worst day ever" for David. David had more worst days ever. The day David took Bathsheba, then those seven days waiting for their son to die. The day he found out his daughter Tamar was raped by his son Amnon. The day David found out his son Amnon was killed by another of his sons, Absalom; Absalom sticking up for his sister Tamar. Then there's that worst day off in the future when David's son Adonijah tried to steal the throne from David's son Solomon.

I don't know, but our lesson today may have been the worst of those worst days ever. You hear the pain in David's voice - "O my son Absalom! My son, my son Absalom! If only I had died instead of you—O Absalom, my son, my son!"

You're wondering, aren't you? How did Absalom get stuck up in that tree? We could talk about his hair, but it wasn't just hair that got Absalom stuck up in that tree. We go back in time, about nine years back. Absalom's half-brother Amnon rapes Absalom's sister, and David rages but does nothing. So Absalom avenges his sister and kills his half-brother Amnon; David mourns, but does nothing. Absalom goes on the run. For 3 years, he's in exile out of the country, for another 2 years, he's in exile in Jerusalem with David his father refusing to see him. It's no wonder (is it?), how or why Absalom did what he did. Absalom was raised to discount his father, raised to take things into his own hands.

And so he did. For four years, Absalom worked to steal the hearts of Israel from his father for himself. For years, Absalom told Israel how he would take better care of them than his father, David, had. Then, after four years of campaigning, Absalom made his play; he sent out word: "Absalom is king!" The people liked what Absalom had been feeding them. We like people who tell us what we want to hear, don't we? David didn't like what he heard; he had to go on the run and flee Jerusalem. By the time Absalom and his army go after him, though, it's too late. David and his army are ready. And Absalom, it seems that Absalom doesn't have a clue as to what to do in battle. He's left hanging, dangling, his head caught up in the branches of an oak tree. What do you do with a traitor hanging by his head in an oak tree? Joab knew. And David? "O my son Absalom! My son, my son, my son!"

The whole thing is just so sad, so broken and messed up and sad. So how did Absalom get his head caught up in that tree? It begins with David taking it easy; instead of taking seriously the roles God had for him, David plays king and takes Bathsheba. Then when his family needed him to step up as a father, a man-of-God kind of father, David stands down, takes the easy way out, and hides. And how does it end? When his people need him to be standing up as king, David is curled up and whimpering. That doesn't fit our usual picture of David, does it? We see David chosen by God, David strong to stand up to Goliath, David strong to stand down before Saul. We see David eager for God, eager to have God front and center in his life, front and center in his kingdom, bringing the ark of God home to Jerusalem. We see David eager to build a temple for God, wowing at God's promise that he, David, would be ancestor of God's forever king. One best-day-ever followed by another best-day-ever. That would be the perfect place to say: "and they all lived happily ever after."

Instead, we find David full of himself taking Bathsheba, killing Uriah. When David gets over himself, he confesses, he's forgiven, and it seems like life can get back to normal, back to life the way that it's supposed to be, godly, blessed, with another chance at "happily ever after." Instead, David stands down as father, and his family goes Jerry Springer on steroids. It's all so sad, so terribly dark and sad.

Sound familiar? We all know some broken families, some broken hearts, don't we? Sometimes we might think: "It's no wonder." Other times we might wonder: "I'm sorry; they're sorry. I'm trying to do right; they're trying to do right. God says he forgives. So why doesn't God fix this? Why doesn't God make things work? Why doesn't God makes things right?"

What are we to make of David's mess? What are we to make of our messes? It's not just the world out there and their sin that twists and destroys. It's not just their sin that tears families apart. It's not just their sin that turns our best-days-ever into our worst-daysever, is it?

Thank God the end of our lesson wasn't the end of David. First, Joab gave David a kick in the pants: "You keep on like this and nobody will want to follow you as king." And then the Holy Spirit refreshed David's heart. Sometimes on our worst days we need a gentle reminder to get off our pity-pot. But even better is when the Spirit of God opens our eyes to see what God has going for us. It took some time for David to see, but he learned to see his worst day ever as yet another day God delivered him from something far worse. Absalom was ready to steal the kingdom from his father, ready to see his father dead, ready to crush all the promises that God had made to David. But God wouldn't let that happen; God didn't let that happen. God stepped in to deliver David from this worst day ever. God stepped in to keep his promise of that forever King who would make life right for his people.

I won't say that after this worst day ever, David lived happily ever after. David was in for some more worst days ever. But God didn't define David by his worst, and God didn't relegate David to a life of the worst. Instead, when David was at his worst, and when David was facing his worst, God answered with his best. When David was his worst self, God answered with grace and forgiveness that had David singing: "**Blessed is the one whose sins are forgiven!**" When David was facing his worst, the worst of this world, God answered with grace and power that had David singing the psalm we sang today: "**From the LORD comes deliverance**."

How could David be so confident? Part of it would be past experience. God had delivered him in the past; no matter how worst his day, God had always delivered him. But David had more than just past experience. David had God's future promise, the promise of that forever King who would be born into his family to rule right and make life right for God's people. Read through David's psalms and you will see that David got to know what we know - God's forever King had some worst days of his own. Worst days that he got himself into, not by his own worst, the worst of his own making, but by taking our worst. After living his best, Jesus took our worst to the cross, crushed and cursed by God. But what did David know and what do we know? God wouldn't leave and he didn't leave Jesus crushed and cursed; he raised Jesus back to life as our forever King. Now with Jesus, you have your worst forgiven and gone, and in baptism you have his best to wear before God.

With Jesus, even after our worst, we get to join David in singing: "Blessed is the one whose sins are forgiven." Even after our worst, we get to hope for better: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me." And just like David, when we're facing the world at its worst, with Jesus we get to look to God and know he will deliver. With Jesus, we get to sing like David: "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me, your rod and your staff, they comfort me." With Jesus, we get to sing like David: "The LORD is my light and my salvation—whom shall I fear? The LORD is the stronghold of my life— of whom shall I be afraid?" With Jesus, we get to sing like David: "Surely goodness and mercy will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever." Even in our worst days, we get to sing like David knowing this - our forever King has a forever best day ever coming for you. Amen.

THE SERVICE

IN OUR WORLD TODAY... we see families with so much hurt and broken-ness. Sometimes we might be tempted to think that godly people wouldn't cause or foster that kind of hurt and broken-ness. Sometimes we might be tempted to think that forgiveness should heal and fix that hurt and broken-ness.

IN OUR WORSHIP TODAY ... we see that the hurt and broken-ness caused by sin is present also in families with God, where forgiveness is treasured, and hearts are eager to walk with God. So what is our hope? Life the way that it is supposed to be is coming - in heaven!

FIRST READING

2 Samuel 15:1–17, 23–26, 30 (select verses)

In the course of time, Absalom provided himself with a chariot and horses and with fifty men to run ahead of him. He would get up early and stand by the side of the road leading to the city gate. Whenever anyone came with a complaint to be placed before the king for a decision, Absalom would call out to him, "What town are you from?" He would answer, "Your servant is from one of the tribes of Israel." Then Absalom would say to him, "Look, your claims are valid and proper, but there is no representative of the king to hear you." And Absalom would add, "If only I were appointed judge in the land! Then everyone who has a complaint or case could come to me and I would see that they receive justice." ...

Absalom behaved in this way toward all the Israelites who came to the king asking for justice, and so he stole the hearts of the people of Israel.

At the end of four years, Absalom said to the king, "Let me go to Hebron and fulfill a vow I made to the LORD. While your servant was living at Geshur in Aram, I made this vow: 'If the LORD takes me back to Jerusalem, I will worship the LORD in Hebron.' "

The king said to him, "Go in peace." So he went to Hebron.

Then Absalom sent secret messengers throughout the tribes of Israel to say, "As soon as you hear the sound of the trumpets, then say, 'Absalom is king in Hebron.' " Two hundred men from Jerusalem had accompanied Absalom. They had been invited as guests and went quite innocently, knowing nothing about the matter. While Absalom was offering sacrifices, he also sent for Ahithophel the Gilonite, David's counselor, to come from Giloh, his hometown. And so the conspiracy gained strength, and Absalom's following kept on increasing. A messenger came and told David, "The hearts of the people of Israel are with Absalom."

Then David said to all his officials who were with him in Jerusalem, "Come! We must flee, or none of us will escape from Absalom. We must leave immediately, or he will move quickly to overtake us and bring ruin on us and put the city to the sword."

The king's officials answered him, "Your servants are ready to do whatever our lord the king chooses."

The king set out, with his entire household following him; but he left ten concubines to take care of the palace.

The whole countryside wept aloud as all the people passed by. The king also crossed the Kidron Valley, and all the people moved on toward the wilderness.

Zadok was there, too, and all the Levites who were with him were carrying the ark of the covenant of God. They set down the ark of God, and Abiathar offered sacrifices until all the people had finished leaving the city.

Then the king said to Zadok, "Take the ark of God back into the city. If I find favor in the LORD's eyes, he will bring me back and let me see it and his dwelling place again. But if he says, 'I am not pleased with you,' then I am ready; let him do to me whatever seems good to him."

But David continued up the Mount of Olives, weeping as he went; his head was covered and he was barefoot. All the people with him covered their heads too and were weeping as they went up.

The Word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**



SECOND READING 2 Samuel 18:1–9, 14–16, 21a, 31–33; 19:5–8 (select verses) David mustered the men who were with him and appointed over them commanders of thousands and commanders of hundreds. David sent out

his troops, a third under the command of Joab, a third under Joab's brother Abishai son of Zeruiah, and a third under Ittai the Gittite. ...

The king commanded Joab, Abishai and Ittai, "Be gentle with the young man Absalom for my sake." And all the troops heard the king giving orders concerning Absalom to each of the commanders.

David's army marched out of the city to fight Israel, and the battle took place in the forest of Ephraim. There Israel's troops were routed by David's men, and the casualties that day were great—twenty thousand men. The battle spread out over the whole countryside, and the forest swallowed up more men that day than the sword.

Now Absalom happened to meet David's men. He was riding his mule, and as the mule went under the thick branches of a large oak, Absalom's hair got caught in the tree. He was left hanging in midair, while the mule he was riding kept on going.

(Joab) took three javelins in his hand and plunged them into Absalom's heart while Absalom was still alive in the oak tree. And ten of Joab's armorbearers surrounded Absalom, struck him and killed him.

Then Joab sounded the trumpet, and the troops stopped pursuing Israel, for Joab halted them.

Then Joab said to a Cushite, "Go, tell the king what you have seen." The Cushite bowed down before Joab and ran off.

Then the Cushite arrived and said, "My lord the king, hear the good news! The LORD has vindicated you today by delivering you from the hand of all who rose up against you."

The king asked the Cushite, "Is the young man Absalom safe?"

The Cushite replied, "May the enemies of my lord the king and all who rise up to harm you be like that young man."

The king was shaken. He went up to the room over the gateway and wept. As he went, he said: "O my son Absalom! My son, my son Absalom! If only I had died instead of you-O Absalom, my son, my son!" ...
